### African American Achievement Plan 2023-2024 Assurances of Implementation of Strategies/Action Steps

During our weekly SLT meetings, the administration team drafted a list of students to meet with and regularly discuss attendance, grades, and course performance. Our SLT continued to review our AA attendance and made suggestions to increase attendance. For PBIS we continued our school wide PBIS initiatives and continued to provide opportunities to use of ticket exchange for displaying positive behavior. This quarter, our school wide opportunities included popcorn party (January 31, 2024), loco for hot cocoa (February 21, 2024), and Superhero Day (March 20, 2024). We continue to have biweekly drawings, drawing five winners per grade level during lunches, including Chic Fila and Countryside Citrus, etc. We also began providing incentives for teachers. Of the five selected winners, PBIS drew three staff winners per grade level.

After his Tuskegee Airmen (1942-1945) service ended, he was introduced at Delaware State College/University for the first time when he was hired to teach mathematics and physics from 1946-1948. Dr. Mishoe later became the President of DSU. He was also the grandfather of Mr. Harris.






(January 31, 1919 - October 24, 1972)



Jack Roosevelt Robinson was an American professional baseball player who became the first African American to play in Major League Baseball in the modern era. Robinson broke the color line when he started at first base for the Brooklyn Dodgers on April 15, 1947

In 1968, Chisholm was the first black woman to be elected to the House of Representatives. Four years later, she became the first Black candidate to run for a major party nomination when she ran for president as a Democrat.


# Madams fun facts


