Results of Action Taken:	Teachers have implemented African American History in lesson plans, that promotes the appreciation of diversity and ensures students learn and understand the history of African Americans. Teachers also shared feedback on the lessons, resources, and the importance of African American History.
Reflection:	In the past, African American History was taught very few times throughout the year, mainly during Black History month. Many teachers lacked content knowledge, confidence, and were concerned about how and what content should be delivered. With the implementation of teacher training and monitoring, a curriculum matrix, and resources provided, this will change the way African American History is viewed in a positive way and make a lasting impact on the education of future generations.
