AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH OF FEBRUARY

02/27, MONDAY: Colin Luther Powell | 1937 – 2021) was an American politician, statesman, diplomat, and United States Army officer who served as the 65th United States Secretary of State from 2001 to 2005. He was the first African-American Secretary of State. He served as the 15th United States National Security Advisor from 1987 to 1989 and as the 12th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1989 to 1993. Was born in New York City in 1937 to parents who had emigrated from Jamaica. He was raised in the South Bronx and educated in the New York City public schools. He was a professional soldier for 35 years, during which time he held many command and staff positions and rose to the rank of four-star general. He was Commander of the U.S. Army Forces Command in 1989. 02/28, TUESDAY. Condoleezza Rice born November 14, 1954

American diplomat and political scientist who is the current director of the Hoover Institution at Stanford University. A member of the Republican Party, she previously served as the 66th United States secretary of state from 2005 to 2009 and as the 19th U.S. national security advisor from 2001 to 2005. Was the first female African-American secretary of state and the first woman to serve as national security advisor. Until the election of Barack Obama as president in 2008, and her predecessor, where the highest-ranking African Americans in the history of the federal executive branch (by virtue of the secretary of state standing fourth in the presidential line of succession). At the time of her appointment as Secretary of State, was the highest-ranking woman in the history of the United States to be in the presidential line of succession.

King delivered a 17-minute speech, later known as "I Have a Dream" in which he envisioned everyone being "able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood.".

[She] was a worker on the Underground Railroad, made 13 trips to the South, helping to free over 70 people. She led people to gain the name "Moses of Her People".

02/23, THURSDAY: Barack Hussein Obama II born August 4, 1961) is an American retired politician who served as the 44th president of the United States from 2009 to 2017. Was the first African-American president of the United States. He previously served as a U.S. senator from Illinois from 2005 to 2008 and as an Illinois state senator from 1997 to 2004, and previously worked as a civil rights lawyer before entering politics.

02/23, THURSDAY: James Earl Jones American Actor 1931-

(He) is an American actor. He has been described as "one of America's most distinguished and versatile" actors for his performances in film, television, and theater. [His] voice has been praised as a "a stirring basso profondo that has lent gravel and gravitas" to his projects, including live-action acting, voice acting, and commercial voice-overs. He was born with a childhood stutter, and has said that poetry and acting helped him overcome the disability. Although he as won 1-3 of the following awards (Academy, Tony, Primetime Emmy, Grammy, and Golden Glove), he gained international fame for his voice acting as Darth Vader in the original 1977 film and Simba's father Mufasa in the Lion King.

02/24, FRIDAY: Benjamin Solomon Carson Sr. (born September 18, 1951) is an American retired neurosurgeon and politician who served as the 17th United States Secretary of Housing and Urban Development from 2017 to 2021. A pioneer in the field of neurosurgery, he was a candidate for President of the United States in the 2016 Republican primaries.

became the director of pediatric neurosurgery at the Johns Hopkins Children's Center in 1984 at age 33, then the youngest chief of pediatric neurosurgery in the United States.

In 1987, he gained significant fame after leading a team of surgeons in the first known separation of conjoined twins joined at the back of the head. His additional accomplishments include performing the first successful neurosurgical procedure on a fetus inside the womb, developing new methods to treat brain-stem tumors, and revitalizing hemispherectomy techniques for controlling seizures He wrote over 100 neurosurgical publications. He retired from medicine in 2013; at the time, he was professor of neurosurgery, oncology, plastic surgery, and pediatrics at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine.[10]

Carson has received numerous honors for his neurosurgery work, including more than 60 honorary doctorate degrees and numerous national merit citations.[16] In 2008, was bestowed the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian award in the United States.[17] In 2010, he was elected into the National Academy of Medicine.[18] has also written or co-written six bestselling books.




